

Zen Buddhism and Saint Mark

I recently was visiting the Zen Buddhist Center near Germantown. As I walked in, I was struck by the simplicity of the large glass building that was meant for meditation for all who came. I had a good conversation with the monk who was there to greet me, Sagaranunda. He spoke of meditating and seeking to fill oneself with loving kindness and compassion for all creation. That sounded good to me.

As we were about to leave, he ushered me over into a main meditation room, again, very simple with kneeling pillows across the floor. Standing at the front of the room was a rock hewn 3-foot statue of the Buddha. It was beautifully cut, and as we talked about it, he told me it was saved from an area in Afghanistan that had been riddled with sectarian violence in the past few years; they had saved it. It was beautifully hand carved, and as I turned to speak to him again, he said, "It's about 2,000 years old."





As we turned to continue to walk outside the building, I caught him make a small bow to the figure, much as a Roman Catholic does when first viewing the altar in a Roman Catholic Church. It struck me as a beautiful sign of his humanity. We had spent most of the time talking about the spiritual and mindful practices that Buddhist tradition gives for anyone, anywhere. They are open to all, and a diverse group of people, from any religion, could use them. Yet he showed his great devotion, his love, for the physical representation of the spiritual leader of his tradition, the Buddha, perhaps without even knowing it.

I believe that Jesus' teaching of the inbreaking of the Reign of God doesn't need any physical reminders, other than the presence of justice. I think that all of us who gather at Saint

Mark could practice the enlightened teachings of Christianity anywhere in Montgomery County or the

world. And yet, we do give thanks and love for the physical representation of our devotion; we do love Saint Mark Church, its sanctuary, the people who come, and the creation which enfolds it.

This month we will be turning, just as Sagaranunda did, to give thanks and reverence for a physical representation of the body of Christ "in the flesh" here in the Stewardship campaign. We can love the Spirit of God, we can love the teaching of Christ, and we can love the wind of the Spirit, but we also must love the very physical presence and financial needs of our community here on Old Georgetown Road; we must revere it.

I hope to take all of you to the Zen Center in the future. Because of our love of Saint Mark, its facilities, staff and ministries, I also look forward to inviting "Nanda" (He said that was simpler to call him by; I agreed) here to continue our ministry of reconciliation and peace begun not so long ago. I look forward to that time.


Saint Mark will host our first speaker of the "Faith in Public Life Speaker Series" under the Rev. Roy W. Howard Scholars program. This program was dedicated in December 2021 after Pastor Roy's retirement (12/2019), and it continues the effort to bring interesting speakers with remarkable stories to Saint Mark to talk about current relevant issues and how they go about living their faith in public life. These speakers challenge us by asking "How shall we respond?"

Our first guest speaker will be Derek Black, raised since childhood to be a leader in the white nationalism movement. His father, Don Black, created and hosted Stormfront, a radical radio show dedicated to growing the white nationalist population worldwide. His godfather, David Duke, was formerly the Grand Wizard of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. But once Derek started attending a liberal Florida college, he

found himself surrounded by interesting, intelligent people from various ethnic and religious backgrounds and began to question the validity of his beliefs. It was a long and often painful journey to discover his truth, and Derek eventually found himself denouncing his former ways. Rejecting those ingrained ideologies came at great personal cost to Derek, who at one point legally changed his name in order to avoid any angry repercussions from his former supporters.


